

Worksheet: Analyzing Character 6

Fables are short stories which illustrate a particular moral and teach a lesson to children. The theme and characters appeal to children and the stories are often humorous and entertaining. Fables have a message in their narrative such as a parable might have. Fables can often pass into our culture as myths and legends and used to teach about morals to children and kids.

The characters of fables and tales are usually animals who act and talk just like people, whilst retaining their animal traits.




Read the short story below. Then answer the questions.
