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Study Assistant 10 Simple Lessons For Keyboarding




KEYBOARDING

In this lesson you will review the keys, especially the number keys, you have learnt.

Special character keys are symbol keys. Some were already learned. The set of special characters keys can be found on the top row of the keyboard and on the top half of the number keys. You will need the Shift key for these special characters.

This is the final lesson. This lesson will help you become a better at typing. There are three timed practices and five review exercises in this lesson.





The Warm-up exercise is necessary to help you learn to stretch your fingers. Sit comfortably and place your hands on the 'hot' keys. Review by saying out loud the letters along the 'hot' keys: **asdf**; **lkj**. Do this without looking at your fingers. Review the 'cold' keys as well.



Let's begin! When you are finished, compare your typing with the instructions. Type the following in the space provided.

Considering how likely we all are to be blown to pieces by it within the next five years, the atomic bomb has not roused so much discussion as might have been expected. Type the following in the space provided. This passage has about 112 words.

Such information as we—that is, the big public—possess on this subject has come to us in a rather indirect way, apropos of President Truman's decision not to hand over certain secrets to the USSR. Some months ago, when the bomb was still only a rumour, there was a widespread belief that splitting the atom was merely a problem for the physicists, and that when they had solved it a new and devastating weapon would be within reach of almost everybody. (At any moment, so the rumour went, some lonely lunatic in a laboratory might blow civilisation to smithereens, as easily as touching off a firework.)



This timed practice focuses on sentences. Each sentence builds in length from 2 standard words to 20 standard words. Each sentence increases by one word. It is done in such a way to help you increase your speed and accuracy. You have 25 seconds to complete this exercise. This is your seventh timed practice. Keep a record of your speed and accuracy.

Why, half the time you're talking about books that cost twelve and sixpence! Chaps like us couldn't spend twelve and sixpence on a book." These, he said, were men who thought nothing of spending several pounds on a day trip to Blackpool.

This idea that the buying, or even the reading, of books is an expensive hobby and beyond the reach of the average person is so widespread that it deserves some detailed examination.
